Important Information

An additional track available at camp in 2009 is the **contra callers' course**, an intensive workshop designed for advanced-beginner through intermediate callers who are ready to work hard at getting to the next level. This course is designed and led by **Lisa Greenleaf**, and has been taught for the past three years at Pinewoods Camp in Massachusetts. Lisa brings many years of experience to her callers' workshops. While calling at camps across the country as well as in Europe, she particularly enjoys observing how people learn to dance as well as how they build effective dance communities.

The course will focus on two particular topics important to any caller: teaching skills (understanding choreography and crafting concise teaching vocabulary) and stage presence (becoming comfortable behind the mic, learning how to handle mistakes or unexpected situations, and working with musicians).

Class Descriptions: During the day, participants should expect to focus most of their energy on the course, which covers three class periods. Each morning will begin with a workshop to cover such topics as teaching figures and recognizing good choreography. The latter half of each morning will be a time for hands-on practice of basic microphone and stage techniques as participants' practice conducting an effective walk-through and working with a band. The afternoon session with Lynn Ackerson will be a part of the all camp open mic, affording callers a chance to be in the large dance hall. At all other times, course participants will be able to participate in all of the regular activities of BACDS American Dance and Music Week. The cost for the course is \$825, the same as for the regular camp participants.

Requirements for the applicants to the course are:

- 1. Be familiar with the AABB structure of contra dance music
- 2. Know the difference between a jig and a reel
- 3. Know how to cue the first figure of the dance off of the four potatoes
- 4. Know how and when to signal the band to go out
- 5. Have called at least 3 contras (individual dances, not evenings) in a real dance setting [Some communities sponsor open mic dances or new callers' nights, and some callers are willing to allow new callers to call one dance during an evening. Or you can get a bunch of friends together and host a dance party, but it needs to be to live music.]
- 6. Have a repertoire of at least 3 dances you know and feel comfortable teaching and calling
- 7. Attend contra dances regularly so that you are familiar with the moves, the culture, and the music
- 8. Be prepared to receive and incorporate feedback, even if you have a lot of calling experience

Participation in the callers' course is by separate application and is limited to six students. A committee will evaluate applicants based on potential, level of serious commitment, and likelihood of making a contribution to their home dance community.

Calling is more than just getting up and prompting a dance. To become a good caller, one must study and understand choreography, work on teaching language, gain knowledge of the different styles of dance music, accept feedback, develop leadership skills, and create a positive stage presence. Obviously, there are many other factors as well. Are you prepared to work hard to acquire these skills?

In this course, Lisa's goal is for you to streamline your teaching and to project an effective stage persona. To get the most out of the work, you will need to have a "beginner's mind", no matter how long you have been calling. You will have to be open to making mistakes and to receiving constructive feedback and supportive suggestions. You will then be expected to incorporate those suggestions quickly. What do you think this experience will be like for you?
